## **From the Chair**

**Dear Friends,**

**It has been my privilege to write ‘from the Chair’ for several years now. This is a very different letter to those of previous years, but a necessary shift in emphasis.**

**For some time, the Committee of the O.G.A. has been considering how best to continue to run the Association. Attendances at events have declined markedly over recent years: events we ran before COVID were only viable with the support of family and friends and last year’s A.G.M. only attracted 15 members in total.**

**Following feedback from a recent A.G.M. we have organised informal ‘get togethers ‘ over coffee, but these have not been well attended – less than 10 members at each event so far.**

**Another issue is that despite requests at every A.G.M., we have had no new committee members come forward for nearly ten years.**

**This broad issue has been brought into a sharper focus in recent weeks. On a personal level my husband and I are planning both to downsize and move out of the area nearer to family, hopefully over the next year. Out of fairness to everyone, I will therefore be resigning as Chair at the A.G.M., and not seeking re—election. None of the current committee wish to take over this role, so a new Chair is needed.**

**Furthermore, Margaret’s term as Treasurer comes to an end at this A.G.M. She has decided, after many years loyal service, that she does wish to step down from this post, but would be prepared to stay on for another year provided that an Assistant Treasurer could be appointed for 2023-2024, who would be prepared to take the role on fully from October 2024.**

**These posts must be filled for the Association to continue. If no-one comes forward we will have no alternative but to ask the A.G.M. to agree that we begin the process of winding up the O.G.A. The forthcoming A.G.M. will therefore largely be devoted to discussing the future.**

Members had the opportunity to chat over coffee and biscuits and to look at the archive material supplied by Rosemarie and Anne.

The meeting opened as usual by remembering in silence those former students and staff who had passed away during the year. Reports followed from the Treasurer and the Flower Fund Secretary. Although Rosemarie and Elisabeth have stepped down from this duty, cards and tokens were still sent out to many old girls at Christmas, and several pieces of correspondence expressing the recipients' thanks showed how much this gesture is still appreciated.

The legacies from Miss Bedford and Sheila Garlick were discussed and the meeting agreed that using the funds to support girls' education in Africa would meet with both ladies' approval. It was therefore decided to make a donation to Under Tree Schools, a charity with associations with Kidderminster, which runs a school in South Sudan for girls who would otherwise have no opportunity for education. Some former students of the school have now been able to progress to training for professions, such as teaching, nursing and government administration.

After the formal meeting we all enjoyed a buffet lunch, with many delicious treats including Indian snacks and scones with jam and cream.

We agreed that next year's A.G.M. should also take place at St. George's.

Dancing in the Avenue was the highlight for some who would have danced late into the night, but sadly all good things have to come to an end and the road was re-opened at 10.00pm.

Once again it was lovely to meet up with families friends and neighbours to celebrate the occasion.

**Gloria Phillips** has sent the following most interesting account of her activities at The Rose Theatre Kidderminster.

### **Behind the scenes at The Rose Theatre**

I have always loved the theatre. As a young child, I was occasionally taken to the Kidderminster Playhouse, to see the pantomime or the touring ballet. After joining K.H.S., my theatre experience widened, with school trips to Shakespeare plays at Stratford-upon-Avon and Birmingham and later to many different plays while at the University of Sheffield, but, whatever I saw at the theatre, much as I enjoyed the plays, I really loved the set designs.

My family and I have attended many excellent plays at The Rose Theatre, being lucky enough to live only a short walk away. However, 42 years of teaching left me with no time to become actively involved in theatre.

I had always intended to visit The Rose on their annual Open Day, but somehow missed it, so when the event was reinstated following the lockdowns I was determined to go. We thoroughly enjoyed our tour, marvelling at the vast array of costumes and props and how carefully they are stored. I had thought that if they were looking for volunteers I might ask to do props, but then I met Sally, a vivacious redhead who paints the sets. I asked so many questions that she saw that I was interested and convinced me that I was up to doing the job and that's how I came to join the set crew at The Rose.

The first play I worked on was the Victorian thriller 'Gaslight'. The set involved a lot of panelling to be painted dark brown, a suitably easy job for a novice. The tricky bit was that we also had to paint flock wallpaper! The walls were initially painted red and then we used a stencilling technique to produce the motifs. It was fun researching a suitable motif on the internet, from this we produced a stencil and the raised effect was applied with a damp sponge. The finished effect under the lightning looked extremely realistic.

The next production was 'The Secret Garden' and for this we used a very simple set of free-standing pieces that were turned around to represent the inside and outside of the house. For this I learned to paint a brick effect, mottled with lichen on the outside.

Since then I have learned many techniques and helped to produce different special effects including terracotta tiling for 'Going Straight', a play set in Spain, and many different wood effects for flooring. Sally and I have a good system for this: I paint the base colour in strips using a long-handled roller and she applies the finishing effects.

We spend a varying amount of time at the theatre, usually a couple of mornings a week, but more if necessary as a production draws near. There is always a lot of fun and joking with the build crew, who work extremely hard to create the sets.

If you have time to spare, the theatre is a very friendly community that always welcomes volunteers. There many roles you could try, including sound and lighting, box office, front of house, bar and many more. And, of course, it is very satisfying to sit in the audience of a production, knowing that you have played a small part in making it happen.

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Over the last year I have bumped into several Old Girls in various places at various times:

I was at Hayley's Kitchen at Hartlebury Castle last September enjoying afternoon tea with some friends I volunteer with at the Coffee Shop at Kidderminster Hospital. There weren't many other customers at the time but a lady at one of the other tables kept looking in our direction and eventually came over remarking "You are Chris aren't you?" to one of the other people I was there with. It turned out to be Sue Bell (née Cook) who had been at school with Chris Titley, the volunteer co-ordinator for the Coffee Shop since they were 7.

Sometimes you bump into old girls in the most unexpected circumstances. I was watching the New Years Day Morris Dancing at the Eagle and Spur in Cookley when someone came up to me and asked if I recognised her – it was Jayne Everett, a fellow 1967 starter.....

Gill Rowe, who started at K.H.S. in 1954 is another old girl I bump into at odd times. Pre-pandemic she and a group of friends were Monday morning regulars at the League of Friends Coffee Shop in Kidderminster Hospital. Lately I have seen her in the restaurant at De Beers Garden Centre. I wonder where we will meet next.

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**1967 starters** – a group of us who started at K.H.S. in 1967 continue to meet at The Running Horse at Bewdley at regular intervals. Usually there are eight of us but we were lucky to be joined a couple of weeks ago by Chris Goggin (née Brook) who was visiting her mother in Stourport while here from America.

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I know of at least two other groups of Old Girls who meet up at regular intervals. Long may they continue!

## **Old Girls' in the Media**

Does the Old Carolian newsletter count as the media? Last summer I was asked to write something for the Old Carolian newsletter by it's editor Norman

Broadfield – the piece below is what I wrote, with apologies to anyone who has already read it in the other newsletter.

1967

Many famous (and infamous) events occurred in 1967. Wikipedia ( how did we manage without Wikipedia) informs us that Milton Keynes was founded as a new town, the first North Sea gas was pumped ashore, Torrey Canyon ran aground of the coast of Cornwall, Expo 67 took place in Montreal and Harold Wilson started the process that enabled Britain to join the European Economic Community.

Wikipedia, for some reason, fails to mention that 1967 was the year I started at Kidderminster High School as a very quiet, shy eleven year old. I was in form 111H and my form tutor was Mrs Crossland, who in her youth had been a suffragette.

The school magazine for that year lists other events not known to Wikipedia:

- Prize giving on November 11<sup>th</sup> was an exceptionally damp day. The speaker at the event was Mr John English from the Midlands' Arts Centre

for Young People. His amusing speech was about how to spend one's leisure time.

- Theatre trips went to Birmingham, Stratford and Coventry, while others went on Field Trips.
- A French Exchange group went to Digne in southern France.
- The choirs and musical groups took part in events such as Kidderminster Schools' Music Festival and the Eisteddfod in Llangollen. It was noted that they would appreciate more support from the Senior School.
- On October 13<sup>th</sup>, a joint meeting of parents from K.H.S. and King Charles met the Count Education Officer to discuss the future of education in the Kidderminster area.
- The Netball and Hockey teams had another successful year.
- The school houses, Chad, Clare, Cynibert, Clent, Caldwell and Cobham all had successful years planning a variety of activities.
- The library gained over 200 new books which caused a bit of a problem with shelf space.
- At the end of the magazine there is a long list of marriages of former pupils and also birth announcements. Sadly, the only family events listed in the current Old Girls newsletters are deaths of past pupils.

The only question remaining following these musings is "How can all these things have happened so long ago?"

## Found on Facebook

Heather Hinton has unearthed interesting articles about both Miss Chalk and Miss Renwick.

The following piece about Miss Chalk is a summary of the chapter about her from the book "Characters of Kidderminster" by Ken Tomkinson published in 1977.

Some old girls have wondered just how long Miss Chalk taught at KHS, here are just a few of the highlights of maybe this most interesting of our teachers. She was born in 1910, the eldest of her family, her father was both a stock broker and a parson and one of her siblings became a missionary in Bangladesh. Her unconventional upbringing probably formed her unique character which made her so memorable. She taught at KHS from 1939 to 1971. During the war years she was even sent with some girls to help farmers with fruit picking. Once the war was over, she resumed her visits to France and also taking groups of students. She enjoyed drama and was part of the Nonentities and was also a member of the Choral Society. It was partly due to these outside commitments that she eventually passed on the mantle of being head of modern languages which she had held since 1939 to Miss Baker. Her famous 'sit up and beg' bicycle, she had purchased second hand in 1929, probably pre war in origin, was only parted with when she and it became unsafe to ride on the road (her description not mine), it is now in Hartlebury Museum.

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Heather followed this up with a summary from an article Miss Renwick wrote which she accidentally found in Kidderminster Library whilst looking for something entirely different!

Miss Renwick first saw KHS in 1955 in February in the snow, that's when she fell in love with the school, her interview was successful and she started that

September. It was her first appointment as headmistress but the staff were very friendly to her. She was responsible for organising the Golden Jubilee of the school in 1962. The school was Commemorated in October 1912, hence when we had the Commemoration Service. Canon Sladen was Chairman of the Governors at the time so we held the service at St Marys, his church, I often wondered why we walked so far! She remembers that us girls were not always 'angelic' but the details have faded from her mind now, replaced by much happier ones, Christmas, the Toy Services, School Concerts etc. She recalls one fire practice when two girls were missing from roll call, they had seen a cat prowling around the guinea pig pen outside Bennett and they couldn't possibly leave them! Miss Renwick also gives thanks not only to the teaching staff but also the support staff, caretakers and groundsmen etc (by experience at other schools often the forgotten people), in helping to ensure the smoothish running of the school. Surprisingly although she enjoyed meeting old girls who visited the school, she was a little frightened of the OGA??? But she soon adjusted and enjoyed their friendship. She says and I quote 'Gratias Hodie Agimus was a happy choice for the KHS school motto, there was a great deal to be thankful for in the life and traditions of this school from 1912 to 1977'.

This is not from a book, just a document written by her kept in Kidderminster Library.
