Sherry recently sent this write up of meeting with school friends after a 54 year gap.

K.H.S. Still Laughing!

A long planned meet up for a group of us old girls eventually took place on a chilly Friday in July last year. It was July 14th, almost 54 years to the day when a few of us had last seen each other at K.H.S. in 1970!

Myself - Sherry Bird (nee Delamont), Marilyn Boyd (née Cadwallader), Elizabeth Hughes (née Swanston), Jennifer Smith (née Phipps), Janet Read, Christine Saint (née Taylor) and Margaret Macartney (née Hardiman) all made it that day, with apologies from one or two who couldn't make it. The years fell away, and despite the inclement weather and being sat outside at Bewdley Museum cafe, we soon reverted to the mainly carefree girls we had all once been.

Most of us had married, had varying amounts of children, and all had faced some of life's less welcome and unplanned changes. All had survived them and could laugh about them, or at least be philosophical! We were soon giggling together about some of our escapades and memories of our time at K.H.S. and thoughts (very fondly usually!) about some of the staff who had launched us on our various career paths. Some of the planned careers hadn't come to fruition – I had planned a career in art, but ended up working in public libraries most of my working career. Jenny had chosen accountancy, Elizabeth ended up in catering and hotels, with a

short spell as a Sub postmaster, (very topical as I write this!) Marilyn was a wellknown face at Kidderminster Hospital reception in C block as it was then. Chris Taylor pretty much followed her art career and ended up as a carpet designer for Woodward Grosvenor/Grosvenor Wilton, some of her designs (and herself !) going all over the world. Janet Read went to Gilt Edge as a computer operator (quite an innovative thing I would have thought then!) Janet left to have her son, and ended her career working at local schools until shortly before retirement. She and Chris have remained best friends ever since school and in almost daily contact ever since. Margaret has had an interesting career in a few fields, teaching, then working in Birmingham helping families and children towards a better and more settled future. She ended up teaching again then worked for Community Transport, which she still actively supports. There was also some sad news that one of our classmates – Carole Bourn had died in March 2023. But that sad news aside, it was a very happy met up, full of chatter and laughter, and we decided we must meet up again before long, especially as Elizabeth was moving up north to be near family. We hoped more old girls could be contacted for the next meet up.

We did indeed meet up again at the Colliers Arms in November, this time Jackie Underwood (Legierski) and Lynette Partridge (Childe) were able to join us, though Jennifer couldn't make it this time. Jackie had been a social worker, and now looks after a gaggle of her grandchildren. Lynette had run a successful nursery and tea room, and although allegedly retired was still working in the same field, leaving behind Christmas wreath making to join us that day.

Once again, it was a very happy meet up, Lynne and Jackie really enjoyed it. Since then I have met up with Chris, Janet and Margaret again and this time Linda Small (née Palfrey) was able to join us. (Chris, Janet and Margaret meet up regularly anyway). Linda still keeps in touch with Rebecca Walker who lives in Evesham now. We very much hope she will be able to join us next time, as well as Jennifer Barrie who is in touch with Marie Davies and I know has also met up with Karen Mottershead. Myra Kingdom who was in S not K as per the rest of us would like to be included too and she is friends with Margaret and knows one or two of us at least. Janet Devonport is another name that came up: we are hoping to contact her too.

So we hope to have an even bigger group of us next time, and have all threatened to go up in a coach to Elizabeth's new home and camp out on her lawn in tents so

we can see her! It's truly been wonderful to catch up with everyone (it's only taken us 50+ years) so long may it continue!

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A chance meeting with Alison Clarke (née Butt) around Kidderminster one day, led to the following piece about her experience working at Wyre Forest Special School

I left school in 1973 and worked in Lloyds Bank, Comberton Hill until December 1987, leaving to have my children. In 1998 I began work in the Stourminster school kitchen as the hours fitted around childcare. We combined with Blakebrook school to form Wyre Forest Special School, moving to our current site in March 2015. Our children have a wide range of needs, including dietary, and can be very specific as to what they will or will not eat. We also encourage 6th form students to undertake work experience with us.

In February 2023, one of our teachers nominated us for a 'Jamie Oliver Good School Food Award', in the category 'Catering Team Champions', sponsored by the Sun newspaper, and to be judged by Joe Wicks. We were assessed on food quality, Free School Meal uptake, Headteachers opinion of us, the care that we take, and more!

James, our chef, had a zoom interview with some of Jamie Oliver's media team, and in the background could see Jamie, Joe Wicks, Mary Berry, Jessica Ennis Hill, Ellie Simmonds and others. We were delighted to be nominated, then short-listed, then making the final 3 from across the country.

We were visited on June 9th for what we believed was the final assessment. Members of the J.O. media team filmed while we worked, a Sun reporter interviewed us, and Arthur Edwards, the royal photographer photographed US! Whilst serving lunch, Joe Wicks came to the counter to request his meal, and presented James with a 'Golden Spoon' trophy - WE HAD WON!

It was lovely to be appreciated, and we were all presented with goods from the Tefal Jamie Oliver Range, and appeared as a centre page spread in the Sun at the end of June, (and in the Shuttle)! We also featured on Jamie's website, and James

was invited to the awards celebration in London in January 2024, along with all the other winners, the judges, and Jamie Oliver **himself.**

It was a surreal experience.

This write up was followed four days later by the following message: If it's not too late, could you possibly add that James was named 'Best School Chef' by Jamie Oliver at the January awards celebration?

He was not allowed to tell us until it was announced in The Sun that was published today!!! (February 7th 2024)

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Eileen Tasker (née Porter) has been involved with the Talking Newspaper for 42 years, she has been Chairman twice and Editor-in-chief for the last 40 years – a remarkable achievement . She sent the following history of the organisation.

The organisation was set up in 1980 by Kidderminster & District Lions Club, who, that year, had raised money to help the local visually handicapped people. Their idea had been to set up a perfumed garden but, through the encouragement of Bob Roberts, himself blind, a talking newspaper was set up for the Wyre Forest District. This service was needed to bring the local news, as reported by The Shuttle and other local newspapers, via tape recorders and tapes on a weekly basis so that listeners could keep abreast of what was happening in their own local area.

From the original six guinea pig listeners the numbers of listeners grew rapidly, at one time to nearly three hundred per week. However, nowadays this is nearer the two hundred plus mark.

The service is run entirely by volunteers, about 50 in all. Each week, on a Friday evening, a team is gathered together consisting of readers, backrooms workers, a technician and an editor to record about 90 minutes of local news. The only week this does not go out is Christmas week and we do allow ourselves a week off then! The listeners do get a special Christmas recording that week as well as their news one. During the year a magazine is also issued about four times and that features interesting items and Outside Broadcasts that there is not time for on the regular

recording. We also keep listeners in touch with anything that we think may be of benefit to them and that they may not know about.

About ten years ago we took the large step of changing from our tape recorders over to digital recording with boom boxes and memory sticks. This has gone down very well with the listeners who after some instruction do not seem to have any more difficulty in operating the new equipment than they did with the tape recorders.

We have had many homes since we began but are now very happily based at the St. Barnabas Community Centre where we occupy enough space for all our production unit.

The service is completely free to our listeners including supplying them with a boom box when they join as a listener.

We are self-funded relying on donations from other charities and other sources such as talks and donations from our listeners (although these are not requested).

This is a very successful service which provides a service where it is néeded to keep visually handicapped people in touch with everyday life in their community.

Following the announcement in the last newsletter about the future of the O.G.A., Beryl Haughton sent me three pages of handwritten memories. After a sterling job by my husband of scanning and putting the pages through optical character recognition (O.C.R.) software these memories are reproduced below.

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Starting my teaching career at K.H.S.

In my final year at Birmingham University I applied for a post as English Teacher at K.H.S. & was appointed for September 1957. They had not reckoned with fewer VK, whose ingenuity in ragging the staff caused their English teacher to walk out at Whitson. The University released me early and in June I presented myself to fill the gap, full of optimism & enthusiasm. Half a term of lower VK nearly convinced me that teaching. was not for me, but as all my other classes were intelligent and

responsive I gritted my teeth and over the subsequent 12 months became quite fond of them!

I found myself in a teachers staff room dominated by teachers of the old school, with high standards and strict values. The learning of younger staff had to be trained in THE RIGHT WAYS. I came to respect, and in many cases, to care for them but it did produce some conflicts of loyalty! Making my form knéel on the floor whilst I measured the length of the gym slips was one duly that I hated, and when the velour hats were replaced by air hostess style models that blow off easily I was horrified when a decision was taken to give detentions if more than two kirby grips each side were used to secure them!

We did not have our own Kitchen for some years & the meals that were delivered were far from Michelin standard. Dinner Duty entailed ensuring clean plates and I felt I had to turn a blind eye to some of the debris - I would not have eaten them myself. On one occasion I could not understand the epidemic of cutlery dropping that had half the room crawling round the floor. I asked one of the sixth form what went on. "They can see Miss X's knickers, Miss". Then there was the green faced young lady who approached me with her plate and begged me, "Don't make me eat it!" I surveyed the grub sticking out of her pastry & gave her a dispensation.

Fundamentally, though, I found myself one of team of hardworking teachers, who cared about their subject and their pupils in equal measure, Sport, Art, Music, Drama, Domestic Science were as important as purely academic subjects, and I had great fun running the Guide companies. (The only Guide Captain to ask her Patrol headers to carry a brick to camp for the fire place and to receive a severe reprimand from the District Commissioner for her scruffy appearance on parade!).

I must also comment on the qualities of our excellent Headmistress, Miss Renwick, not always recognised because of her dignified demeanour. There were many occasions when her good sense, her kindness and her sense of humour were invaluable to me.

I have no regrets about the 7 years I spent at K.H.S. and am still in touch with some of my pupils over 60 years later.

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The newsletter also motivated Gloria Whight (née Deubert) to send me her memories (also handwritten). Sadly, despite his best efforts, my husband could not get the O.C.R. reader to recognise much of the text.

K.H.S. was already a well-known girl's school when I won one of the 10 scholarships per year for Grammar School education. Unlike many then and now I loved school. Many of the girls travelled daily by train (no school buses then) and those of us in the town walked up the long hill past the railway station from where it was just a short walk. Later, when I had a bicycle I cycled from the other side of town up Bewdley Hill.

These were the War Years. Paper shortages, our exercise books had to be scrutinised each time before we could have a new one, we had to write in every margin, top, sides & bottom. (But it was during these I made lifetime friends).

I owe a debt to many of the teachers of that era. Miss Whittaker, (I went on to study English). My love of Shakespeare was founded at K.H.S with our annual visits to the Stratford Theatre and the local Rose Theatre (formerly Kidderminster Playhouse), where we were fortunate to have "live performances". I remember the Ballet Rambert for one.

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One of the girls I am still in touch with from my schooldays is Sue Whistance-Smith (née Cartwright). Her mum, Mary became cook at K.H.S. in 1970 and Sue has recently lent me her mums cookery book from 1981. Mary revolutionised school lunches by introducing self-service lunches rather than the system previously used where each table was made up of an assortment of different year group students , the youngest of which had to fetch and carry the meals to the table. It includes handwritten menu plans, shopping lists and recipes. Who remembers (with fondness) Melting Moments, Macarons, Chocolate Cracknel, Butterscotch and Chocolate Sponge.

For anyone wishing to revisit their past, the ingredients list for Melting Moments is:

3lbs flour, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ gs B.P., 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs lard, 12 gs marg, 1-12 gs sugar, 4 eggs.

The above quantities make 150 Melting Moments and cost £7.50 in 1981.

The list of ingredients for Chocolate Cracknel is:

³⁄₄ lbs marg, 2 lbs sugar, ³⁄₄ lbs D. Milk, 3 ozs cocoa, 1lb 6oz cornflakes.

This made 108 pieces.

While I'm sure I wouldn't ever want to make 150 Melting Moments or 108 pieces of Chocolate Cracknel in one go, it must be possible to work out smaller quantities......

Rest assured Sue, I've kept your book safe and will return it to you next time we meet at The Running Horse. Thank you.

Treasurer's Report.

There were no queries. Margaret Bazley was thanked for her work over the past year.

The report was proposed by Margaret and seconded by Sue Smith.

Website and Newsletter Report.

Anne and her husband were meeting with the person who had run the website for 5 years, (a friend of Alison Hargreaves) and the last payment for this service had been in 2022. It was suggested that we could transfer to another server and if it was possible, this may save money. Anne would look into this.

Sue Smith whose Mother had been in charge of luncheon catering gave a short description of her mother's time at the school and the improvement to the menus and presentation. It was hoped for a fuller account in next year's newsletter and the recipe for cheese soufflé and shortcake plus other recipes would be given. The last newsletter would be produced at the end of March.

Flower Fund Report.

Rosemarie Moore and Elisabeth Robinson had resigned from running the flower fund and as no one else volunteered to take it on it was left to Rosemarie Morgan and Anne Budworth to carry on with it. Rosemarie Moore said she was willing to buy vouchers for Christmas and to send them to anyone who would appreciate one. This would be the last time flowers, gifts or vouchers would be given.

Chairman's Report.

Rosemarie Morgan said this was a sad time but as numbers of Old Girls attending meetings had declined and no one had volunteered to take on positions of Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Treasurer and committee members it was inevitable that the O.G.A. should cease. Since Kidderminster High School for Girls had amalgamated with King Charles 1st School, any girl who left the school would join the Old Carolians and so it was unavoidable that at some time in the future the O.G.A. would finish. The time had now arrived and the meeting on May 4th 2024 will be the final meeting of the association. The annexe will be booked and it was hoped that there will be a good number of attendees. Rosemarie said that she had been in touch with the Hive in Worcester and they would be happy to store memorabilia of K.H.S. All this would need to be catalogued and with no duplicates. Therefore any duplicates would be offered to members at the final meeting. As seen from the bank accounts the association is not short of money and the committee felt that it would be fitting for all members whose subscriptions were up to date would receive a small memento of their schooldays.

As mentioned previously, Christmas gifts would be given this year and a note would be enclosed explaining the situation. At the close of the meeting a discussion would be held for ideas of charitable institutions that should receive a donation from monies left over after all expenses had been paid.

Rosemarie had been unable to attend the Old Carolians' dinner in 2023 but had spoken to the Chairman to ask if any O.G.A. members could join them if they so desired.

Rosemarie proposed that the process of winding up the O.G.A. should begin; Jane King seconded the proposal with all in favour but with great sadness.
