Once the news of our impending trip filtered out, the Old Girls' grapevine swung into action, and we were offered help and hospitality from all over the islands - from people we had never even met. What a welcome we received from them all.

On North Island we had a delightful stay with Margaret Greenway (1929-40) in Kati Kati. A lovely lady. It was such an inspiration to be with her. Later, on South Island we stayed with Linda (née Mann) and David Cox (an Old Wolvernian) at their home in Oxford near Christchurch. We spent many happy and hilarious hours in their company. The greatest highlight of this visit was the Reunion organised by Linda. I was astonished to find quite a posse of former High School pupils living in that area comprising Linda's own mother Irene Hoedemakers (née Shutt), Jennifer James (née Oakes), plus an amazing apparition clad in the old school uniform complete with gym tunic and white girdle, and school purse containing bun money in florins and threepenny bits. This proved to be Diana Gooseman (née Slater). Pat Collins (née Yarrington) had hoped to be present but was otherwise engaged in organising a craft exhibition. We raised a toast to the Old School with a resounding Gratias Hodie Agimus. Of course there was much sifting through old memories and photographs, and a great deal of laughter from the ladies present with considerable bemusement from their assorted husbands. It felt quite surreal to be sitting in a garden on the other side of the world on a hot sunny November day, reliving those past school days. These younger couples had emigrated to New Zealand many years ago and must have found life quite a challenge. Real pioneering stuff, because New Zealand was not nearly so well developed forty years ago.

It was sad to leave these friends, but The Network still had one treat in store for us. Jennifer Morris (née Astill) had alerted her daughter Louise, so shortly before returning home for Christmas we were able to spend some time in Te Kuiti with Louise, Steve and their enchanting daughter Laura, who were busy running about delivering their homegrown Christmas trees and decorating a float for the Santa Parade.

Altogether, an exhilarating few weeks, which we hope to repeat as soon as possible (be warned Kiwis!).

So, borrowing a phrase from Edward Fitzgerald, what of the "unborn tomorrows"? Why fret about them? It is good to reminisce about the old days. Our futures are built on past experiences, but we cannot live in the past. Those days were not all as golden as they appear in memory, and I should not like to have to hand over my automatic washing machine, or lose my central heating. Is the thought of email, the Internet and dot.com any more scaring than the sound of droves of German bombers passing overhead, or the threat of nuclear war? I think not. Innovations are not all bad! The new technology can be quite exciting. We shall survive, learn new skills and adapt, and who knows — I might yet live to plant my feet on the moon, taking a KHS time capsule of course!

In the Express and Star in October 1999 appeared a photograph of **Sheila Bishop (née Nash)** planting a black pear tree in the grounds of Hartlebury Castle, a millennium gift from her W.I.

In The Shuttle on 11th November came a report of research undertaken by **Margaret Phelan** with Philip Smith O.B.E. into the history of the marble plaque at New Meeting Church and of the thirteen young church goers who died during the First World War. The results of their research, a 27 page document has been placed in the Imperial War Museum.
