FROM THE EDITOR

I write this as I gaze across the fields to the river Teme two fields away, where a light pearly mist lingers. The sun is shining in a bright blue sky, with one small cloud (no bigger than a man's hand) hovering above the Mortimer Forest on the horizon. A swathe of yellow rattle, hawkbit, knapweed and poppies nod in the breeze. A typical English summer's day, with only the sound of the swallows twittering to break the silence. A day for counting one's blessings. It is all too easy to forget that only yesterday the illusion of peace was shattered by the screaming of lowflying jets of assorted Air Forces on manoeuvres, and that beyond these sunny skies thousands of people are suffering from the effects of war, terrorism, famine and other disasters, both natural and man-made.

A few short months ago, on Boxing Day, the world was shaken by the Tsunami in East Asia. Without being there, we can only imagine the full horror and anguish of the tragedy. Sadly, one of our number was there. Kim Peatfield (nee Ree) (KHS 1975—KCI 1982), who now lives in Derbyshire, was holidaying with her family at Tangalla in Sri Lanka. Kim's 5 year old daughter Isabella died in the disaster. Kim's Bewdley family, with the help of Wyre Forest residents, raised more than £10,000 for the Isabella Peatfield Memorial Fund. The overall total is now in excess of £20,000 including £8,000 contributed by the TV programme The Bill, for which Kim's husband is a Set designer.

Kim and her husband flew back to Sri Lanka in February to see how the money would be used. Some had already helped to rebuild a Tangalla school. The fund is also helping to rebuild the hospital in the village where Isabella died and the children's ward\will be dedicated to her. Her parents have pledged to help refurbish an orphanage and a home for disabled children and young adults.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to Kim and her family in their terrible loss. We are filled with admiration for their determination to put aside their own tragedy and work to help the shattered communities where their daughter died.

Betty Caswell nee Edwards (1942-9) and her husband Geoff celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary in July 2004 with friends on a Russian River Cruise. **Rita Sheppy (KHS 1942-9)** was one of the party. Since then, Betty has published a fourth Cookley book: "Cookley in the 21st Century: The Early Years 2000-2003." It includes information about organizations in the village, a comparison between pupils at Cookley Sebright First School in 1905 and 2001, and a brief history of The Titan Wheels factory

Eileen Tasker (nee Porter)(1948-53) was pictured in the Kidderminster Chronicle in February 2005 in an article reporting the 25th anniversary of The Wyre Forest Talking Newspaper. She is an editor.

Pie Gethin (Staff 1937-47 and 1952-73) is now living in Romsey. Her daughter Jill (1958-65) is to be Mayor of Romsey in 2005-2006, and her sister Sally Williams (nee Gethin) (1962-69) is to be Mayor's Escort.

Beverley Newey (nee Hobbs) (1968-75) has celebrated 25 years with Marks and Spencer. She attended the Company's long service awards in London, which included a champagne reception and a West End Show. She has been a staff manager and Human Resources Manager at a number of stores. She joined the Kidderminster Store in June 2004.

Margaret White(nee Jones)(1942-47) and her husband Dennis have moved back to Kidderminster from Kenilworth.

Pamela Upsall (nee Rowley) (1947-54) hears from Pam Park (nee Richards) in Berrynarbor and goes walking regularly with Kay Pagett (nee Hayes). She is still church warden at St. Cecilia's Church and enjoys her grandson who lives in Derbyshire.

REUNION

Lyn Chamberlain a KHS pupil between 1965 and 1972 has sent an entertaining account of the reunion she organized for her particular year group, in July 2004. She realized one day that most of those who attended KHS during 1965-72 would be fifty that year. She wondered where her old friends were, and what they were doing. She thought of the influence the friendships she formed at school had had on her – and

determined to track down as many as she could. By Christmas, 34 friends had been found and so, Lyn says, the fantasy became reality with the aid of Beryl Bedford and The George Hotel, Bewdley. Lyn says, "I organized a three part reunion where people could come and go as they liked. The weekend of 3rd July arrived and my first thought was, 'What have I done, why have I come here?' I felt incredibly nervous and was stunned by it. As we approached the school others said their hearts were pounding and that they were surprised by this reaction too. We met Beryl (unchanged by the passing years) and waited for others to arrive, walking towards us with just the same emotions written all over their faces; an unforgettable experience. It was fabulous to meet everybody again in the actual school and to tour it together.

We entered the school led by our Head Girl of the time-Sara Wormald, (now Peart). I felt sixteen again. The school was changed beyond belief. It seemed tiny. What had seemed so large and impressive was small and ordinary. We toured our old classrooms and the school grounds, all changed, only Hillgrove remaining the same. We reminisced about teachers and form rooms and stood in the halls where we used to gather for assemblies. We remembered how the floors used to be shining from the close proximity of 500 pairs of navy blue knickers every morning. Following the tour of the school many of us spent the afternoon in the coffee lounge at The George. We pored over old photos and school magazines. Other girls who had missed the tour joined us and we had such a good time. We laughed till tears ran down our cheeks. We had arranged to meet at The George for dinner at 8. Gradually everyone started arriving. Yet more new faces. The atmosphere was immediately wonderful. There was such a buzz. When we sat down for dinner there were 32 of us. The food was excellent. It was great to hear stories of people's lives and to relive our schooldays at the same time. To be together like that again in our 50th year was a joy.

For me it was certainly a life-affirming event. I loved every minute of it. We will certainly be doing it all again when we are sixty-so watch this space!"

Ed's Note: For My year group, 1946-53, 2006 will see the 60th anniversary of our entering the portals of KHS. Perhaps we should have another reunion??
