Having both parents as accountants our two children were adamant that was not what they were going to do. School life is an integral part of the community and Charlotte was pleased to point out to us the recent news item that reported on English Head Teachers making a trip to the island to see "how it should be done".

We have visited a few times in term time and I have been press-ganged into helping on school trips – once to the local Wildlife Park (not quite on the same scale as the Safari Park but lovely nonetheless) and the local bowling alley. Those poor little 5 year olds were exhausted when they got back to school having walked a good mile each way plus having to manhandle those heavy bowling balls.

We did not know much about the island until Charlotte moved there but we now visit two or three times a year and find, like many people say, that the island is a microcosm of English life. O.G.A. members who are also National Trust members should be aware if they ever visit that there is a reciprocal arrangement with Manx Heritage – it is not widely advertised.

James, our son followed me in having a penchant for Maths but left me behind at some point in his early teens; he went on to achieve his early ambition in gaining a place at Oxford to read Maths and Computer Science, We were very proud parents just over three years later when we attended his graduation which took place in the historic Sheldonian Theatre in the centre of Oxford. Carole Hughes (née Amis) 1957-64

Carole attended and enjoyed the A.G.M. last year and has sent the following information about her life since leaving K.H.S.

When I left K.H.S. in 1964 bound for St Mary's C of E Teacher Training College in Cheltenham, the idea that 9 years from then I would be a Merchant Navy Officer was unthinkable and certainly unbelievable.

However after posts in Soham and Sutton Coldfield, whilst visiting my newly retired parents in the New Forest in 1970, I toured a South African vessel, the S/A Vaal, berthed in Southampton.

She was a large, white, seagoing palace with a magnificent Children's Learning Centre. On this deck there was a replica "Noah's Ark", a pirates cabin with hammocks, furniture and equipment that would grace the most up to the minute primary school. Here was the Junior Marines' Club – a place for 6-12 year olds to take part in art, craft, needlework, games including chess, prepare for competitions, fancy dress treasure chests, train for the Sunday Service Choir, undertake visits to the bridge, where messages were written

and posted in bottles attached to balloons and cast into the sea. (I did have one reply from Rhodesia.) We underwent the "Crossing the Line" ceremony, swam, prepared for a Charity Children's Fayre which made a large amount of money for a chosen charity each voyage.

In addition there were facilities for babies and children under 5 in the ship's nursery, a separate space with a sandpit and water play area where two trained Nursery Stewardesses cared for the young.

The Children's Hostess needed to be a fully qualified teacher with experience of teaching 5-12 year olds and be at least 27 years old. Together with the nursery nursing staff this was the Education Team and we supervised mealtimes and parties for the children between other activities.

Among other things at my interview, I was asked if I could sing and dance – not the usual entry on my C.V.! However, the ability to have a go proved invaluable as in the evening the ship's officers became the entertainment for the passengers. We performed revue type sketches and pantomime as well as Formation Dancing, Cossack Dancing, Panel Games and solo musical items. This was travelling by sea to South Africa, South America and the Med, not cruising as we know it today with professionals in charge of theatre productions.

I was appointed in 1973 to the flagship of the fleet, R.M.S. Windsor Castle taking Royal Mail, families and holiday travellers to South Africa, calling at Las Palmas, Madeira, Cape Town, coastal ports to Durban and return- all of which took six weeks. We then had 10 days leave in the U.K.

I have visited some fascinating places and met a large variety of people. There were often 100 children on board and once the grandchildren of Paul Getty – quite a responsibility.

The highlight of my career at sea was meeting my future husband; he was Scottish, a bachelor and just happened to be Commodore Chief Engineer. In 1977 the ship was sold to a Greek company and she was to become a floating hotel moored in Jeddah. I was offered a position aboard but it was not connected with teaching and by now I had met John and we were soon to be married.

I resumed teaching at a pre-prep private school in Hampshire where we made more memories for 10 years before moving to Bromyard.

Life at sea for me was very much a learning curve, a finishing school if you like and made an enormous impact on my own development, having been born in the rural surrounds of Bewdley.

I have always been well grounded, however, and this is in no small way due to my teachers at K.H.S. from 1957-64.

O.G.A. Centenary

We are all aware that this year is the centenary of the the commencement of World War I. It is also the centenary of the formation of Kidderminster High School Old Girls' Association.

In December 1914 the then Headmistress, Miss Raymond invited a group of pupils to her home to knit for the troops. This knitting group became a social group which evolved into the O.G.A.

At a recent committee meeting when discussing how we might commemorate the centenary, the suggestion was made that perhaps we could also knit for today's servicemen. The Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham is where military patients are cared for before many go on to rehabilitation at Hadley Court.

Sheila Garlick who works as a volunteer at the QE, spoke to one of the ward sisters and asked about knitted hats for the patients. The sister was pleased with the idea and suggested that the hats could be in the colours of the three services (navy, khaki or marine blue). If any member of the O.G.A. would like to knit a hat in uniform colours they could be passed on to the hospital.

There are many free hat patterns available on the internet. A particularly good source is Ravelry (www.ravelry.com). The patterns below have been worked out by the editor – please feel free to copy and knit as often as you like.

For hand knitters.

Materials.

75 g double knitting yarn, 3.25 mm needles (old size 10), 4mm needles (old size 8)

With the smaller needles cast on 100 stitches and work 3 inches of K1 P1 rib, Change to the larger needles and work in stocking stitch until the work measures 9 inches in total.

Next row: K2 together 50 times.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2 together 25 times.

Next row: Purl.

Next row: K2 together 12 times K1.

Break yarn and thread through remaining stitches, draw up tightly and fasten off. Sew seam. Add bobble if required.

For machine knitters.

Materials.

50g 4 ply yarn. Main tension 7. Rib tension 3/3.

With ribber in place cast on 110 stitches by your chosen method and work 40 rows K1P1 rib. Transfer all stitches to main bed and work 90 rows stocking stitch. Using transfer tool, transfer alternate stitches and knit 4 rows. Knit a few rows in waste yarn and remove from the machine. Using a yarn needle thread the yarn end through the stitches of the last row knitted in main yarn and gather together. Join off yarn and sew seam.

These are both very basic patterns which could be adapted to make more interesting hats; for example double the amount of rib and fold the extra back as a cuff, use a different rib formation instead of K1 P1 rib, add a few extra stitches and incorporate a few cables....... The list is endless and I am sure if you knit you will be able to think of other pattern variations.

Finished hats can be brought to the AGM or sent to the editor.

May Phillips – a brief life story.

May was born in Abergavenny on 8th January 1929 and moved to Adam Street, Kidderminster when she was eight days old.

May played netball for the County and was also a rower. On leaving K.H.S. she worked at Steatite for 2 years. Then she went to Worcester College to train to teach juniors. She taught at Hill Street Primary School at Stourbridge, Wilden, Kidderminster College and Franche Primary School. She finally retired, having helped children in her retirement with writing and other skills, aged 75.

She married Trevor and had 3 daughters, the first of whom, Vanda, was born in 1958, and then Alison and Lisa.

May was a very skilful needlewoman and made beautiful wedding and evening dresses. She made vestments for St Bartholemew's Church in Arley Kings, her local church.

May was Treasurer of the O.G.A. for 44 years (1957-2001) and was a coopted member of the committee up to the time of her death on 6th November 2013.

Her funeral was attended by a number of O.G.A. members.

We were the last intake to Kidderminster High School for Girls who took the 11+ and were there from 1975 onwards. I left in 1980 and Claire stayed on to 6th Form and left in 1982. Claire went on to join the Navy, married a naval man and also had a son. Claire has lived down in Plymouth in more recent years and unfortunately had an accident at home a few weeks ago from which she did not recover. Claire would have been joining the 50 year old club in June and it is such a sad loss so young

We will sadly miss her interesting letters which we would receive just about every month. She was great at keeping us up to date with what was going on in Kidderminster and also at St John's Church where we worshipped with her up to our emigrating to Australia in 1971. She will be greatly missed.
