


KIDDERMINSTER HIGH SCHOOL O.G.A. CENTENARY NEWSLETTER 2013

Review of the Centenary Celebrations

On Saturday, October 6th 2012 we celebrated 100 years since the opening of the K.H.S. building in Chester Road.

At 11 o'clock around 50 past pupils gathered for a tour round the School in its present form. The visitors spanned a wide age range and many people discovered friends and acquaintances that they knew from when they were at school. The weather was kind and we wandered around the grounds rediscovering places like the Rose Garden. The statue is not currently gracing the pool in the Rose Garden but has been removed for safekeeping. As I work at King Charles, I was able to give current information about the school during the tour which linked with people's memories of their time there. As an added bonus, the current Headteacher, Tim Gulliver was on site doing some paperwork, so we unexpectedly had access to the staffroom(library in our day) and his office to the right of the Hillgrove entrance which was previously used as a Lower Sixth Form Room. The honours boards had also been recently rediscovered and these were on show in the Oldfield Hall. There are plans for them to be permanently on display in the Oldfield Hall at some point in the future.

Special thanks must be given both to Sheila Garlick for her help and to Chris Goggin(née Brook), who at zero notice was also roped in to help. Although Chris now lives in America, she did work at the school when she and her family moved back to Kidderminster for a few years and so was the ideal person to help escort a group round when it was realised how many Old Girls were actually there.

While some of us were reliving our lost youth wandering around school, others were with the choir at St Mary's Church, practising singing the school song under the expert guidance of Rosemarie Morgan (née Pitt).

In keeping with true K.H.S. tradition, music was an important feature of the Centenary Commemoration service.

Organising the choir for the service could have been a somewhat daunting task, but turned out to be nothing but a privilege, due to the enthusiasm and commitment of all the willing volunteers.

A rehearsal held at St Mary's Chantry on 22nd September meant that about a dozen were able to go through music chosen for the service, (as well as having a lovely time catching up!), and provide a 'lead' for those unable to join with us until the morning of the service.

Seeing so many join together on the morning of the service was great, and a good rehearsal filled us all with confidence. Thanks from everyone in the choir must go to Rosemary Gibbs for organising the lovely lunch in the Chantry, enabling us both to catch our breath and have a lovely social time together.

The choir's contributions to the service, as well as leading the hymns, were the anthem 'The Lord is my Shepherd' by Howard Goodall (perhaps better known as the 'Vicar of Dibley 'theme), in which mention must be made of our soloists, Caroline Worthington and Judy Neale. The benediction 'God be in my head' was, for me, a most moving experience. As it ended, light streamed in through the stained glass window above the altar - a very special moment in time. Leading the church full of Old Girls in the singing of the school song, must also be one of my highlights of the day.

The organist for our service was David Morgan, until recently Director of Music at St Mary's Church, and the son of an Old Girl—me! His contribution, in music before and after the service, and accompanying both the hymns and the choir was invaluable, and an important aspect of the whole atmosphere of the service. (As an Old Carolian, it was interesting to have him become part of K.H.S. history.)

Many favourable comments were received about the contributions we made to the service, and thanks must go to everyone who was part of the choir. I really felt that the beautiful flowers given to me afterwards should have been shared by everyone in the choir. The choir included the following people:

The church service was planned to start at 3 o'clock but people started to arrive well before that and by 3 the church was packed with ex-pupils, teachers and friends of the OGA, all eagerly awaiting the service to be conducted by an Old Girl, the Revd. Alex Vaccaro (née Mills K.H.S. 1975-77, KC1 1977-82).

The welcoming speech, given by Shiela Hodges (née Jacobs) is given below.

On behalf of all the people who have been associated in any way with Kidderminster High School for Girls, may I welcome you to this service of thanksgiving for the 100 years the school and its successor have been on the Chester Road site.

Why me? Well, I have been associated with the school for 80 years. I joined the Kindergarten in 1932, had all my school education there, had three daughters as pupils there, taught there, and now my youngest granddaughter is about to take her GCSE's.

The original building was first occupied by the school in September 1912, so has played a part in all our lives. Even in this throwaway age it seems that the only change has been the introduction of double glazing. Such places were built to last, as K.H.S. was built to last. The name has gone but the spirit lives on. Through all these 80 years I have admired and loved the school. It has influenced every one of us and helped to make us what we are.

So – Welcome to our Thanksgiving Service: in the words of the school motto 'Gratias Hodie Agimus' We give thanks today.

After the service guests mingled outside the church and in the Chantry, where light refreshments were served. Many friendships were rekindled and the buzz of conversation was constant. There were opportunities for photos, both official and impromptu – many appearing on Facebook quite soon after the day.



At least two groups of pupils had arranged meals for the evening. The 1964 starters met up at The Mercure Hotel – an enjoyable time was had by all.

The 1952 and 1967 starters joined together for a meal at La Brasserie in Kidderminster town centre. Around 100 people attended including John Armstrong, a former Chemistry teacher. Also at this meal were Chris Goggin (née Brook) and Libby Shewry (née Owen) both of whom had travelled a long way to attend. Libby produced a set of school badges which she had had made in Australia. She distributed these during the evening but two people missed out as two of the badges made a bid for freedom and hid in Libby's quite expansive handbag.
